The Addison is a striking collection of townhomes just north of West Hollywood's Melrose Avenue, in the heart of a district renowned for its trend-forward boutiques and restaurants. The modern, two-story unit featured here boasts warm tones and myriad wood finishes, but residents will likely spend much of their time on the generously sized terrace, which comes complete with sofas and a firepit. Not many dwellings can claim to have been inspired by Patti Smith, but this Lower East Side residence, part of the Essex Crossing development, does just that. Occupying an entire city block, One Essex Crossing embraces the neighborhood's eclectic heritage, incorporating the new location of the 82-year-old Essex Market. Unlike the area's famed tenements of yore, this building is light-filled, and it even has a 9,000-square-foot interior garden.

Designed by style guru Jean Lin—whose muse was punk rock pioneer Smith—this unit combines earthy colors and sleek furnishings, offering a tranquil respite after a night at Beauty & Essex or The Bowery Ballroom, both just blocks away. oneessexcrossing.com
